6 Sandell Building, Station Road

Opened by The London and South Coast Railway as the first Worthing Station on Nov 25th 1845. Threatened with demolition in 1971 and later restored by Frank Sandell and Sons (Worthing Ltd.) in 1988.

7 Henfrey Smail (1909-1979) 6 Landsdowne Cl Naturalist , writer on transport history and Worthing's leading local historian lived in this house from its completion in 1930 until his death.

8 Gladys Morgan (1898-1983) 30 Salisbury Rd Comedienne, Star of Stage, Radio, and TV lived here from 1958 to 1983. Leaflet available describing her life

9 W.H.Hudson (1841-1922) 8 Bedford Row Writer on Countryside matters stayed here and at No. 14 on various occasions from June 1918. Leaflet available describing his life

10 Private William Cooper, Cranmer Road 24th Regiment of Foot who fought the gallant Zulus at Rourke's Drift 1879 lived and died here.

11 Provident House, Grafton Road

Formerly the Worthing Soup Kitchen 1892-1922 Erected by The Worthing Provident Relief Society and designed by A.T.Cooke.

12 Philip McCutchan (1920-1996), 107 Portland Rd Author of Contemporary Thrillers and Historical Military Fiction lived here from 1963 to 1996. Leaflet available describing his life

A place of Anglican worship until 1995 and now a Community Centre. Leaflet available describing the History of the Building

4 Jane Austen (1775-1817) Novelist stayed here at Stanford Cottage (Now

Pizza Express in Stanford Square, off Warwick Street) from 18th September 1805 to the year end. Leaflet available describing her visit to Worthing

Warnes (Built in 1899) Marine Parade 2 Plaques:

- George Warne (1864-1916), an early motoring enthusiast who, in 1899, promoted his new hotel as The Motorist's Mecca

 Famous visitors included King Edward VII, King George V, Emperor Haille Selassie, Winston Churchill, General Montgomery, General Eisenhower and John Philip Sousa. Closed in 1985 and burned down in 1987.
